Going Postal

Remember in November of 2018, when the Virgin Post Office stopped providing service? Many felt a sense of panic that we were next. Virgin's Contract Postal Unit (CPU) became inoperative because the owner chose to close. The attempts of the USPS to find another person or business to provide the service was unsuccessful as the bids they received were "significantly higher than the previous contract and not aligned with

those of similarly sized CPUs," says Sherry Patterson, a USPS Corporate Communications Strategic Communications Specialist for AZ, NM, NV, and UT. Ms Patterson also assures me that in regards to the Springdale Post Office "there are no plans to close or relocate the facility."

Bottom line: our post office was never in danger of closure. The sky was never falling after all. Whew.

Candidates Open House & Information

Last Tuesday, I went to the candidates open house as a resident, not as a "newspaper reporter." I spoke with one candidate in regards to something about which I feel strongly and I could tell that the candidate was trying to mollify me in a way not possible if the questions had been asked in an open forum with everyone listening. Springdale Candidate Forum Feedback

I attended the "Meet the Candidate Open House Event" on Tuesday July 15th at the Canyon Community Center. The event was billed as an opportunity to hear directly from the candidates as they share their vision and priorities for Springdale. There was a smattering of attendance that I won't try to estimate and I heard many comments about the attendees being the usual suspects.

In our past elections there are roughly three hundred votes cast. Our elections are usually decided by a dozen or two votes. We, properly, don't have political parties backing or promoting our candidates. When we have a primary our citizens can't just vote party, they actually need to know who they are voting for and why they are voting for them.

This event, sponsored by the "Town," did absolutely nothing to prepare the voters of Springdale to make their decisions. It felt more like a cocktail party than a candidate night. The candidates had no opportunity to address the entire crowd and therefore no way to differentiate themselves from their opponents. More importantly, the residents, collectively were not able to hear from the candidates and know what they stand for.

One of the candidates didn't even show-up, allowing us no reason to support or oppose his candidacy. One mayoral candidate did set up a table to discuss issues and obtain feedback on resident priorities and stated that he was focused on, resident feedback,

town finances, infrastructure maintenance and improvements. All the other candidates had similar platforms stressing town character, their prior experience and a heavy dose of affordable housing goals.

This "Meet the Candidates" event left the residents of Springdale choosing, in a virtual popularity contest, our next "Prom Court". The town needs to be focused on the future, these positions are important and the candidates should be expected to tell us what they are for and what they are not for. If they are incumbents, they should tell us what they accomplished, if they are newcomers, they should tell us why we should vote for them. And yes, they should defend those goals against the goals of their opponents.

I believe these candidates would be more than willing to defend their visions if given a chance. The failure of this event should not be held against the candidates.

I suggest the candidates should get together and set up some real debates before primary voting so we can learn their priorities and analyze their vision for our future. Maybe two, one for the Mayoral and one for the Council positions. We should allow 2-3 hours for each so that they can have in-depth discussions. And if only a few participate I urge you all to attend or participate via Zoom and support the candidate that you most agree with, not who your friend tells you to back.

If not, can someone tell me the theme of this year's Prom?

Worth Mentioning

Mr. Elger's suggestion that the candidates set up some real debates is a valid one. I don't think the candidates quite knew how to use last Tuesday as a forum for their platforms any more than I knew how to use it effectively to find out their platforms and opinions.

One helpful idea was presented by Pat Campbell (mayoral candidate) who had poster-sized paper on his table with various headings, under which you could give him your two cents worth. The headings included "What's One Thing YOU Would Change," "What's One Thing YOU Would Protect," and "What's one thing I could do as Mayor that would make you say: "I'm glad I voted for Pat." Though Pat's table still didn't allow for debates among the candidates, or a way to hear public answers from them to ascertain their views, this was at

least a way to express *our* views in a format that Pat could access after a potentially forgettable conversation.

I don't know how to advocate for a Town Hall type of forum, but we really need that, in my humble opinion, and hopefully the opinions of many, if not all, of the candidates themselves.

Our Town Staff are generally amazingly knowledgeable, and competent. They help Town Council and Planning Commission, largely inexperienced volunteers, to do their jobs. It was a member of the Town Staff who chose the format for last Tuesday, but, despite our gratitude for all they do for us, we need to remind ourselves that the Staff works for us, not vice versa.

A Town Hall, please.

20 Proven Tips for Better Sleep

1. Power Down

Turn off screens and blue light (phones, TVs, computers) at least 1 hour before bed.

2. Nix the Naps

If you must nap, keep it under 20 minutes and early in the day.

3. Block the Clock

Staring at the time causes stress. Turn your clock away or keep it out of sight.

4. Use a Leg Pillow

For back sleepers, a pillow under the knees helps align the spine. Side sleepers—place one between your legs.

Support your neck properly. Avoid sleeping on your stomach—it twists your neck unnaturally.

6. Seal Your Mattress

Use dust-proof covers to block allergens like dust mites and mold.

Limit fluids 1–2 hours before bed to avoid late-night bathroom runs.

14. Lower the Lights

Dim lights 2–3 hours before bed to encourage melatonin production.

15. Reduce Noise

Use a white noise machine, fan, or earplugs to block out disruptive sounds.

16. Skip the Smoke

Nicotine is a stimulant that disrupts sleep. Quitting can dramatically improve your rest.

17. Pets in Their Own Beds

As much as we love them, pets can disturb your sleep and bring in allergens.

18. Clear Your Mind

Write down worries or tomorrow's to-dos. Wind down with calming activities—reading, music, or a warm bath.

19. Use Sleep Aids Sparingly

Sleeping pills can help short-term, but use caution—they may be habit-forming.

20. Talk to Your Doctor

If sleep troubles last more than a month, discuss them with your physician. Conditions like reflux, asthma, or depression may be factors.

Bottom Line:

Sleep isn't a luxury—it's a foundation of your health. Protect it. Prioritize it. And don't be afraid to *let the world wait while you rest*.



Springdale Community Experience

<u>Planning Commission</u> — As Chair of the Commission I have been an active participant for 5 years not to ensure our Town remains the place where you want to continue to live. I was actively involved in the last rewrite of the Springdale General Plan in 2022 and I use this document to help guide the direction of our Town. I believe we need more active participation from our residents, especially those who have been impacted by the negative effects of commercial development; as we need to ensure all voices are heard prior to Town meetings. And I have been actively working to protect our natural environment by protecting our viewscapes, our night sky and the Virgin River Corridor.



Springdale Housing Committee — On the housing committee, I've taken an active role in obtaining the Redhawk lots for the Town and focusing on developing the homes per the original plan that was conceived in the early 2000's. This plan will allow these Redhawk homes to be tailor-made to meet the ownership needs of our Springdale and Zion National Park employees. In addition to these homes, affordable apartments will be provided at Trapper Circle and these units will also provide long-term housing for our canyon workforce. I'm especially proud of the fact that both of these projects (Redhawk and Trapper Circle) have been planned and designed using valuable input from nearby residents. Now that Springdale has selected a housing provider to build and manage our affordable housing, these affordable units will be dedicated as long-term units in perpetuity.

Redhawk at Springdale HOA — As President of the Redhawk HOA, I have been actively working to revitalize our neighborhood as a mix of conventional and affordable homes. This project has allowed us to modify our CC&Rs to accommodate use of a Community Land Trust model to ensure the new affordable homes are carefully folded into our neighborhood.

A Balance for the Future



But we may need to recognize the interdependence between our Park and its visitors, the Springdale business community and our Town residents. 




Jack Burns has lived in the Springdale/Rockville area since 1982. He retired from the National Park Service in 2021 after a 36-year career, all of it served at Zion.

While I have not always agreed with all the changes, I do think Springdale has done a good job of remaining a livable town because we have adopted strong town ordinances that we continually modify to keep up with the needs of the town. I have been a part of this process as both a town resident and, more recently, as a town council member. I have always voted for what I felt would be best for the town.
